Principal's Report

We were delighted to welcome over 350 family members who packed the Performing Arts Centre on 17 August as part of the Year 9 & 10 Subject Counselling Information Night. Several days later 90 family members were also welcomed. They came to hear what was involved with the first student cohort undertaking new SACE moving from Year 11 in 2010 to Year 12 in 2011.

Research has shown that family support for students, as demonstrated by being interested in school and attending school events, has a very positive effect on student outcomes. Families know what is happening at school and can better support their son or daughter. It signals to students that their families value education and the difference it makes in terms of successful life outcomes. It also provides the opportunity for the significant adults in the student's life from home and school to talk together face to face.

Upcoming Subject Selection Meetings

By now all parents/caregivers of students in Year 9 – 11 would have booked their appointment with their son or daughter's Home Group teacher using the online system (see details on page 4) to have the discussion about 2011 subjects. It is essential that all students attend these sessions in uniform and accompanied by their parent/caregiver(s). Being there means that the family can hear the student's conversation with the school staff particularly in relation to which subjects are confirmed for processing, which are provisional, and which are not recommended. Again it demonstrates to your son/daughter the importance of education and choosing their future pathway thoughtfully.

Unaccompanied students will not be able to have their subject requests processed on the day. If there is a reason that family members are unable to attend then please contact the relevant Home Group teacher to book an alternative time.

School Values and Statement of Purpose

As part of the school's demonstration of its commitment to excellence a Celebration Assembly was held on 19 August. School leaders and Governing

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Principal's Report continued

Council members were very pleased to welcome over 150 family members who came to support their students. We said at the assembly that those students presented to the school community represented the tip of the 'excellence iceberg'. Many other students achieved outstanding results and many students who may not have achieved 'A' grades certainly achieved their personal best. This is what the school stands for: all students being 'stretched' by challenging, personalised learning to achieve their best in the whole range of school programs.

For next year we are looking at how we can also recognise students who significantly improve their results as well as those who achieve the top grades.

On the Student Free Day in Week 8 (6 Sept) staff will work through the school values and what they think the school needs to stand for. A consultant Judi Quinn who worked with us on reviewing the international programs in 2008 will lead this process. Judi has already talked with Governing Council and Student Forum members.

Later this term students in Years 8 – 11 will work with their Home Group teachers to discuss values and to use a range of processes to decide what values are most important to them. After students have engaged in this process they will be asked to interview their family members to see what values families think the school needs to have. Then the students' ideas and the families' ideas will be compared as part of Home Group discussions.

The values we are particularly interested in looking at are those that fit with the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights which is required by all CIS-accredited schools and also the International Baccalaureate values. We want to move beyond the values that everyone wants all of society to practise to those values that strategically differentiate Glenunga International High School. One student working with our consultant described GIHS as a *sanctuary for learning*. ...others have talked about *international thinking* and the *intercultural harmony*.

Finally a Planning Group will bring the information together into a draft and send this out to all families in Term 4 for their feedback.

Year 8 Lap Top Program

Letters are going home to all Year 8 families this week giving them details of the arrival of the lap tops and the starting date for the Lap Top Program. The computers have finally arrived in Australia after coming on a SLOW boat from Taiwan. It will be a very exciting moment when all the pieces of the technology jigsaw puzzle come into alignment. Our 1000 user wireless network and dual ISP are now on line and the computers are being imaged. The program launch date is expected in Week 1 Term 4.

Council of International Schools (CIS)

In the last Newsletter I said that I was honoured to be invited to co-chair an accreditation review at Toorak College an exclusive private school in Melbourne which achieves outstanding VCE results and which has been a 'lap top school' for Years 5 – 12 for the past 5 years.

I was lucky enough to be partnered with a very experienced co-chair who is considered to be one of the best 'CIS chairs' in the world. He has reviewed over 35 schools all over the world as well as continuing his day job as Dean of Education at an American University that has a graduate campus in Madrid. CIS evaluators all need to be working as education leaders in schools or universities. Our Deputy Principal Jeremy Cogan and Director of Studies are booked into the next CIS training session with a view to them being able to be part of a team prior to our evaluation visit.

My learning curve was very steep, but it was professionally very rewarding to be part of a thirteen person team embedded in a school for five days. The team provided the school with over 115 commendations and a similar amount of recommendations. The experience has affirmed that the work we have been doing with our Strategic Directions has positioned us very strongly. It also provided me with important strategic insights into the preparation we will need to undertake for our Preliminary Visit in November 2011.

Japanese Visit





Subject Selection Meetings

Your son or daughter will be making his or her subject selections for 2011 very soon. **Subject Selection Meetings** are scheduled for the following days:

- **Year 11 – Tuesday 31 August (9 am – 6:30 pm)**
- **Year 10 – Thursday 2 September (9 am – 5:00 pm)**
– as part of the PLP Pathway Planning Day
- **Year 9 – Friday 10 September (9 am – 5pm)**

Normal lessons are cancelled for the year level on their particular Subject Selection day. Instead each student (and his or her parent(s)/caregivers) attends a fifteen minute meeting with the Home Group teacher. Subject selection meetings will be held in the International Centre. Please note that students are expected to wear full school uniform when they attend their meeting.

At the meeting the student presents his or her choice of curriculum pathway, the reasons for the choice and the subjects that have been selected to support the chosen pathway. During recent extended Home Group sessions students have been getting prepared for this process. They have familiarised themselves with the Curriculum Guide and have had the curriculum pattern applicable to their year level explained. They have thought about their pathway and have become aware of any required subjects and the necessary grades needing to be achieved to progress confidently to the next year level.

The Home Group teacher will check that the curriculum pathway is appropriate and that suitable subjects have been selected. They will also check that the particular year level curriculum pattern described in the Curriculum Guide and any *Requirements for Success* criteria have been met. The student and the parent sign-off on the selected subjects and take a copy of these selections home. The school keeps the official Subject Selection Form and enters the student's selections into our computer system. Once all of the subject selections have been entered the school's Timetable Committee makes decisions about the number of classes that will run for 2011. Any students affected by those decisions will be contacted early in term four and re-counselled in conjunction with their parents.

Parents need to use our new online booking system to schedule their fifteen minute meeting with the Home Group teacher. Using this system you will be able to book the interview times that suit you best from any internet-connected computer.

Please access the system as follows:

- Go to the school's website www.gihs.sa.edu.au
- Click on the **[PTO] Parent / Teacher On-Line Booking** link
- Enter your login and PIN number.

Full instructions are provided to you after log in.

Please note the following points:

- When you log on the system displays only your own son/daughter. Bookings are made for individual parents/caregivers not for couples.
- You will only see time slots which are **available** at the time you are using the system. As time slots are booked for teachers those timeslots are no longer displayed as available. PTO prevents double-booking of teachers or parents/caregivers.
- When you have made all the bookings you require you can print a **report** of your bookings in time order. You can log in and change bookings any time **up to 8am on the day of the interviews**.
- Other parents may be making bookings at the same time that you are using the system. It is possible, though unlikely, that a timeslot is displayed to you as available, but is then booked by another parent shortly afterwards. If you then attempt to book this timeslot it will not be available and a message will be displayed to indicate this.

- If you do not have access to the internet please call the friendly office staff on 8379 5629 and they will be able to book your appointment time over the phone.

Cyber Safety and Responsible Digital Awareness Competition

In response to the rapidly changing digital world we live in GIHS recently ran a *Cyber Safety and Responsible Digital Awareness Competition* across all year levels. One of the aims of this competition was to put Cyber Safety at the forefront of school and community consciousness by offering an attractive reward (iPad) in a competition format. Another aim was to present Cyber Safety as a sub-set of the more global concept of *Responsible Digital Citizenship* and hence to promote positive attitudes and actions with our new found powers in the rapidly evolving digital world.

The competition was run throughout Term 2 as a collaboration between teaching staff, the Student

Forum and representatives of the Governing Council. The competition required students to produce positive creative interpretations of *Cyber Safety and Responsible Digital Citizenship*. Over thirty entries were received from a combination of more than fifty students in a wide range of digital platforms such as video, posters, websites, animations and even a scrap book. Prizes which also included external hard drives for all award winners were funded through a state government Cyber Safety educational grant. 

Eight of our senior debaters are also preparing to compete in the *Boutros Ghali Shield* held at the **University of Adelaide Friday 27 August.** They will be debating in a series of mock resolutions similar to the United Nations Council. In addition to giving speeches the debaters will be asking difficult questions of their fellow Ambassadors making objections and negotiating behind the scenes in a separate Negotiation Chamber!

The school recently held a very successful *Battle of the Bands* with seven quality bands participating. The Performing Arts Centre was packed to capacity during the lunch-time performance. The event coincided with Casual Day which added to the exciting atmosphere for the band members and audience. Funds raised from Casual Day are going to the overseas children we sponsor and to local projects in our school grounds.

One of our Year 9 Home Groups recently held a *pizza and drinks* stall to raise money for an orphanage in Cambodia - well done Home Group 9.1.

Each year during the 40 Hour Famine we hold a *lock-in* from Saturday evening to Sunday lunch-time in order for our students to support each other during the most difficult hours of the fast. 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School Dental Service

The South Australian Dental Service provides a range of dental services for children at clinics throughout Adelaide and all major country regional centres.

Dental care is provided by dental teams comprising of Dentists, Dental Therapists and Dental Assistants.

All children from birth up to 18 years of age are eligible for care with the School Dental Service. Fees may apply.

Monday to Friday
Opening hours 8.45am – 4.15pm

- All children under the age of 18 years who **are** dependants of/or holders of Centrelink Concession Cards or School Cards are eligible to receive free dental care through the School Dental Service
- A fee per child for each course of dental care applies to children or students who are **not** dependants of/or holders of Centrelink Concession Cards or School Cards (a general course of dental care in the School Dental Service may include check ups, x-rays taken at the clinic, fillings and preventive services such as fluoride treatments)
- Dental emergencies treated at a School Dental Clinic between check ups will be covered by the fee paid at your child's current check up.

The first and last general course of care will be provided to all School Dental Service clients free of charge regardless of their card holder status.

Parents of children with special physical or intellectual needs should contact their local School Dental Clinic to discuss their child's needs.
